1. Executive summary

MnDOT is conducting an Equity and Health Assessment Figure 1. Project area map (EHA) during the Scoping Decision Document (SDD) and Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for Highway (Hwy) 252/I-94 in Brooklyn Park, Brooklyn Center, and Minneapolis. The purpose of the EHA is to understand equity and health priorities from community members adjacent to the project area so MnDOT can consider them when deciding highway improvements.

The EHA is administered by MnDOT's Sustainability and Public Health Division, with support from an interagency working group. MnDOT also convened an Equity and Health Neighborhood Advisors (EHNA) group to describe equity and health conditions in their and provide communities input on potential transportation improvements to Hwy 252/I-94.

About this report

This Equity and Health Community Priorities Report (Report #2) is the second of three EHA reports that will be considered as public input to the Hwy 252/I-94 Scoping Decision Document (SDD). The report summarizes the community engagement process and findings from engaging historically underserved and overburdened communities adjacent to Hwy 252/I-94 about their equity and health priorities. Health and equity priorities from community members were identified in the EHA Baseline Conditions Report ("Report #1") by analyzing existing conditions. The third report will assess Hwy 252/I-94 SDD project alternatives and recommendations to inform potential changes to the SDD to consider before MnDOT finalizes the project alternatives.



Report findings

The EHA engagement process focused on listening to historically underserved and overburdened populations living in Minneapolis, Brooklyn Center, and Brooklyn Park, including Black people, Indigenous people, and people of color (BIPOC); people with low incomes; the elderly; and people with a disability. The project team conducted an online survey and 15 targeted in-person activities between April 15 and May 6, 2022, including pop-ups and canvassing events in the project area. A total of 412 people provided feedback. Eighty percent of participants live in the project area, of which 47 percent (or 153 participants) identify as BIPOC.

Key takeaways

The following key takeaways, listed below in no particular order, summarize overarching themes heard from all participants during this engagement:

- People said all equity and health focus areas are important and related to each other.
 People drew the connections between the EHA topics discussed, and no issue fell to the bottom of the list as unimportant.
- Health is the top priority because without it, there is nothing. Many people commented that
 for the project to prioritize health, it needs to prioritize people rather than maximizing capacity
 and ease of travel for cars. Some people recommended reframing the focus of Hwy 252/I-94
 improvements from investing in highway infrastructure to investing in healthier communities
 and families.
- People said sense of community is important for health and equity in their community. People identified that a key component to a healthy community is a community where people feel secure in the place where they live and connected to one another. An equitable and well-designed Hwy 252/I-94 can help bring people together and increase safety, access, and quality of life for the communities living adjacent to the highway.
- More transportation options can increase health and equity in communities. A healthy community has transportation options that provide a safe, affordable, efficient, and environmentally friendly way to travel. Many people said their community needs more viable transportation options and emphasized that highway improvements should not only support cars, but also walking, biking, rolling, and public transit.
- Nearby jobs, healthy food, and green space helps people live healthier lives. People said access to jobs, healthy food, and greenspace is a priority. People need easy access to healthy options to be healthy.
- People expressed concerns for property changes resulting from the Hwy 252/I-94 project.
 People are concerned about neighborhoods losing homes, property values decreasing, and
 communities being destroyed to expand the highway. Some people described how past
 construction projects on I-94 and I-35W disproportionately affected BIPOC communities in the
 Twin Cities.

- People are concerned about air pollution affecting the future and quality of life for communities adjacent to Hwy 252/I-94. Many people said air pollution from Hwy 252/I-94 traffic affects the health and well-being of people living next to the highway. Some shared concerns that expanding the highway could increase traffic, smog, and air pollution which could increase health issues and asthma levels in nearby communities.
- Environmental health and the health of the Mississippi River ecosystem is a concern for communities. Beyond the health of people, commenters also expressed concern for the health of the environment, particularly the nearby Mississippi River and the wildlife that relies on it. Some were concerned that expanding Hwy 252/I-94 would require more pavement and infrastructure and cause more water pollution from highway runoff. Others shared concerns that carbon emissions from increased traffic could increase the severity of climate change.
- Safety along and crossing Hwy 252/I-94 is a key concern. A common sentiment from the engagement was the need to make Hwy 252/I-94 safer for all users. Many people said that they are concerned about traffic speeding, car crashes, and reckless drivers. Some people said they intentionally avoid walking, biking, and driving in the project area, even when it is the most direct route, because they are afraid for their safety.
- Any outcomes from Hwy 252/I-94 improvements should be fair and equitably distributed
 to highway users. Many people said that Hwy 252/I-94 improvements should not solely benefit
 pass-through traffic and commuters at the expense of residents and communities along the
 highway. Making it more difficult for residents to access their homes, jobs, and public
 transportation via walking, biking, or driving burdens everyone in the community, but
 particularly people with low incomes, the elderly, people with a disability, and BIPOC families.
- A community-centered engagement process on the Hwy 252/I-94 project alternatives will
 provide community members more say in the highway design. People said that selecting a
 preferred alternative fairly and equitably cannot occur without listening to concerns and input
 from the people most burdened by changes to the highway. Some recommended especially
 engaging populations historically left out of government decision-making, including BIPOC
 communities, people with low incomes, the elderly, and people with a disability.

Next steps

This report summarizes public input received as part of the community engagement process for the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA. The community feedback document in this report will support a community-driven health and equity review of the Hwy 252/I-94 project alternatives. The review and recommendations on the project alternatives will be provided in Report #3 – EHA of Hwy 252/I-94 Draft SDD. 2. Introduction

MnDOT is conducting an Equity and Health Assessment (EHA) during the Scoping Decision Document (SDD) and Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for Highway (Hwy) 252/I-94 in Brooklyn Park, Brooklyn Center, and Minneapolis. The purpose of the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA is to understand how transportation affects equity and health in the project area so MnDOT can consider this information as it makes decisions

about the project.

This report summarizes public input received in the spring of 2022 as part of the community engagement process for the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA. The purpose of community engagement for the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA is to engage historically underserved and overburdened populations on issues of equity and health and to use community feedback for the evaluation of Hwy 252/I-94 project alternatives.

Project overview

The Hwy 252/I-94 project area runs for approximately 12 miles between the Hwy 610/252 interchange in Brooklyn Park and the 4th Street/I-94 interchange in Minneapolis. The Mississippi River is less than one-half mile to the east of the project area.

Hwy 252/I-94 runs through some of the most racially and ethnically diverse areas/of the state. Nearly 60 percent of the project area identifies as Black or African American, Asian, or Hispanic/Latino. The proportion of people of color is highest in North Minneapolis and in Brooklyn Center north of I-94 and west of Hwy 252.

About this report

The Equity and Health Community Priorities Report (Report #2) both advances the findings from the EHA Baseline Conditions Report ("Report 1") and informs the next report, the EHA of Hwy 252/I-94 draft SDD ("Report 3"). The

Community Priorities Report summarizes how community members prioritize the equity and health focus areas identified in the previous Baseline Conditions Report and informs the framework for a community-driven equity and health assessment of the Hwy 252/I-94 project alternatives for the final SDD. MnDOT will document and include the findings and public input gathered for this report in the final SDD and respond to substantive public comments as part of the SDD process.

EHA leadership and staff

The EHA is administered by MnDOT's Sustainability and Public Health Division, with support of an interagency working group. To ground this EHA in community, MnDOT convened an Equity and Health Neighborhood Advisors (EHNA) group. This group, which is facilitated by the Center for Urban and Regional Affairs (CURA) at the University of Minnesota, meets regularly to guide the EHA. MnDOT hired SRF Consulting Group to coordinate the EHA, and SRF has supplemented their team with Bellwether Consulting, Fairhope Consulting, and NewPublica.

3. Engagement process

Between April 15 and May 6, 2022, the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA project team conducted targeted virtual and in-person engagement with the public. These engagement opportunities were focused on reaching residents living along the Hwy 252/I-94 project area in Brooklyn Park, Brooklyn Center, and North Minneapolis, with an intentional effort to engage Black people, Indigenous people, and People of Color (BIPOC). The decision to target EHA engagement opportunities on BIPOC communities was guided by MnDOT's Transportation Equity Commitment, Definition, and Acknowledgment, which states:

Transportation equity means the benefits and burdens of transportation systems, services, and spending are fair and just, which historically has not been the case. Transportation equity requires ensuring people of underserved communities, especially Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, share in the power of decision-making (Draft statement as of July 2022).

The community engagement process and the results provided in this report emphasize the participation and feedback from people who live in neighborhoods adjacent to Hwy 252/I-94 and who identify as belonging to BIPOC communities. While other demographic data was collected from participants and is provided in this section, highlights and results were only disaggregated by race/ethnicity and geography.

Engagement activities

The project team conducted an online survey and 15 in-person activities to collect community feedback for the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA. A total of 412 people provided feedback. Fifty-one percent of participants identify as BIPOC, 80 percent live within a half-mile of the project area, and 37 percent identify as BIPOC and live within a half-mile of the project area. The follow sections summarize the engagement activities. More data is provided on the demographics of participants later in the report.

Survey

To solicit community input virtually, the project team created an online survey asking participants to identify the transportation focus areas they feel are most important to equity and health in the project area and provide demographic information. See <u>online survey in Appendix A</u>. The online survey was live March 29 through May 15, 2022.

In addition, to capture feedback at in-person events, the project team created a simplified, shortened version of the survey. The shortened survey still collected comparable responses to the longer online version of the survey. Paper surveys were translated into Hmong, Somali, and Spanish. See the <u>shortened survey in Appendix A</u>.

A total of 336 online surveys and 76 shortened surveys were completed during the EHA engagement period. Responses collected through both versions of the survey are combined and summarized in the sections below.

Pop-ups

Pop-up events allowed the project team to connect with communities in places they are already gathering and potentially reach an audience who may not have heard about the project online. Project staff surveyed participants with paper copies of the survey and used a dot exercise and post-it note activity to collect input on boards. See pop-up boards in Appendix A.

Nine pop-up events were held in the Hwy 252/I-94 project area between April 15 and May 6, 2022. Pop-ups were prioritized in locations along the project area to reach historically underserved and overburdened

populations including BIPOC, people with low incomes, the elderly, and people with a disability. One-hundred thirty-seven people were engaged through pop-up events.

Canvassing

Canvassing, or door-knocking, allowed the team to reach residents in the Hwy 252/I-94 project area. Residents completed short surveys on tablets supplied by project staff. Project staff left flyers at homes and apartment buildings when there was no response. Project staff focused on reaching renters through canvassing, and left flyers with property managers at several large multi-family residential buildings in the project area. Flyers provided project information and a QR code to complete the online survey. Flyers were translated into Hmong, Somali and Spanish. See the <u>flyer in Appendix A</u>.

There were six canvassing events during the engagement period. Twenty-two people were engaged through canvassing and 16 people identified as BIPOC.

Notification methods

Public notification of the engagement opportunities occurred through existing channels of project partners. Project staff coordinated with the Hwy 252/I-94 Environmental Review project team, City staff, and community organizations to share the online survey with their networks.

Social media

Hwy 252/I-94 EHA project staff coordinated with project partners and cities to share survey information on social media. Posts were published on Brooklyn Center, Brooklyn Park, and CAPI's Facebook pages.

GovDelivery update

Project staff published a GovDelivery email update to the MnDOT Hwy 252/I-94 Environmental Review subscriber list promoting the online survey.

Demographics of participants

Hwy 252/I-94 EHA engagement intentionally sought feedback from historically underserved and overburdened populations living in Minneapolis, Brooklyn Center, and Brooklyn Park. This includes people that have been underserved, overburdened, and marginalized by public policy, investments, and decision-making including Black people, Indigenous people, and people of color (BIPOC).

The survey asked participants to share their demographic data so the team could understand if the project was reaching its intended audience. Participants could choose to not answer the demographic questions.

Location

For this engagement process, participants who *live in the project area* live within a half-mile of Hwy 252/I-94. Online survey participants were asked to self-report if they live along Hwy 252/I-94, and people who participated through canvassing and community pop-ups in the project area were assumed to live there. Eighty percent of participants live in the project area, of which 47 percent (or 153 participants) identify as BIPOC.



Of the 153 BIPOC participants living within the project area, just under half said that they live in Minneapolis and approximately a quarter live in Brooklyn Park and Brooklyn Center.

Race/Ethnicity

The project team established a goal of reaching BIPOC people during the engagement process that is equivalent to one percent of BIPOC residents living within the project area; 200 participants identify as Black or African American, 100 identify as Asian, and 60 identify as Hispanic or Latino.

Actual participants included 121 people identify as Black or African American, 23 identify as Asian, 54 identify Hispanic or Latino, and 11 as another non-White race or more than one race. Overall, 51 percent of total participants engaged identified as BIPOC.



Gender

Participants were asked to report their gender in the online survey and in-person engagement. Of the 412 total participants, 52 percent identify as female, 48 percent as male, 2 percent prefer not to answer, and one person identifies as transgender.

Age

Age was collected through the survey and in-person engagement. Most participants reported that their age is between 25 years and 74 years. One percent reported their age under 18 years, four percent reported their age as 18-24, and 6 percent reported their age as over 75 years.



Education level

Education level was only collected through the online survey. There were 336 responses to the online survey. Thirty-two percent of survey participants are college graduates. 26 percent have completed post

graduate work, 15 percent have completed some college, 12 percent have completed high school or less, and six percent completed technical or vocational school.

4. Key takeaways

The Hwy 252/I-94 EHA project staff gathered input and had conversations with community members about how to make Hwy 252/I-94 improvements equitable. A key component of the engagement process was listening to voices from historically underserved and overburdened populations. This section summarizes overarching themes heard from participants during this engagement. These takeaways are not listed in any particular order. Most of the quotations highlighted below are from participants who identify as BIPOC. Sections 5 and 6 provide a detailed summary of the results.

- People said all equity and health focus areas are important and related to each other.
 People drew the connections between the EHA topics discussed, and no issue fell to the bottom of the list as unimportant.
- Health is the top priority because without it, there is nothing. Many people commented that for the project to prioritize health, it needs to prioritize people rather

than maximizing capacity and ease of travel for cars. Some people recommended reframing the focus of Hwy 252/I-94 improvements from investing in highway infrastructure to investing in healthier communities and families.

This section summarizes how participants ranked the health and equity focus areas and the reasons they are important to them. The health and equity focus areas shared with participants are described in the table below.



Online survey participants ranked the focus areas from one to six, and the in-person activity asked participants to select their top three priorities. Across all survey results for participants in the project area, the project team analyzed how often the focus area was selected within participants' top three priorities.

Access to jobs, healthy food, and greenspace was most often selected as a top priority for BIPOC participants, followed by safety, environment and human health, property changes, sense of community, and transportation options. Notably, BIPOC participants were more likely to rank access to jobs, healthy food, and greenspace higher than White participants in the project area.

Sense of community

People who ranked this focus area high said that for a community to be healthy, people need to feel welcomed, safe, and secure in the place where they live and connected to one another. Comments said that improvements to Hwy 252/I-94 should help bring people together by increasing safety, access, and quality of life for the communities living near the highway.

In addition, many participants said that they selected sense of community as their top focus area because for this project to prioritize health, it needs to prioritize communities rather than cars and maximizing highway capacity. Some participants said MnDOT should reframe the focus of Hwy 252/I-94 improvements from investing in highway to investing in healthier communities.

Common things people said about sense of community:

- Many comments about this focus area were about how feeling pride in your community and knowing your neighbors is important to create a healthy and thriving community.
- Many people said that communities need to be prioritized over cars when MnDOT is considering changes to Hwy 252/I-94.
- Some people said that sense of community and residents' quality of life could be improved with increased police enforcement and less crime.

Comments about sense of community:

"Sense of community is all encompassing and extremely important for safety, especially for Black people."

"Without wellness and health no individual can thrive. When individuals are not thriving, the community will not thrive. Reducing the negative environmental and health impacts are critical for this community...Honoring people's sense of home and security is another dimension of wellness. There really isn't an unimportant topic on the list. The community is paying the price for poor and inequitable planning in the past."

Transportation options

People said that more transportation options can increase health and equity in communities by providing efficient, affordable, and environmentally friendly ways to travel besides by car. Many people said that their community needs more public transit, and many people emphasized that Hwy 252/I-94 improvements should not only support cars, but also create safe connections for walking, biking, and rolling across the highway. Some people also said providing more transportation options can improve community health by reducing carbon emissions and increasing opportunities for physical activity as well as improve people's emotional and mental health.

Comments about transportation options:

"It's important to prioritize those who need easier means of transportation including a variety of modes (biking, walking) and a healthy environment promotes healthier people."

"Hwy 252 benefits those who commute on the highway. More people should use public transportation because there would be less traffic."

Common themes about transportation options:

- Many people said that communities along Hwy 252/I-94 need more reliable and frequent public transit service to and from key destinations for jobs, food, and health care.
- Many people said that they feel unsafe walking, biking, and rolling across Hwy 252/I-94 and waiting at bus stops near the highway.
- Some people said that more frequent and reliable public transit would help get people out of cars so Hwy 252/I-94 would not need to be expanded and there would be less pollution.
- Some said driving in heavy traffic on Hwy 252/I-94 is stressful and providing more transportation options, like walking and biking trails, could improve people's emotional and mental health beyond their physical health.

Access to jobs, healthy food, and greenspace

People said access to jobs, healthy food, and greenspace is a priority because for people to be healthy, they need to have easy access to healthy options. Communities with few job opportunities, no healthcare options, and limited access to grocery stores, parks, and greenspaces can hold people back from living healthy lives. In addition, the distance or time it takes to get to these destinations by walking, biking, driving, and transit can also be a barrier.

Highlights from comments about access:

- Many people said access is important because you can't be healthy without the option to be healthy.
- Many people said easy access to destinations like doctor's offices, pharmacies, grocery stores, trails, and parks improves the wellbeing and quality of life of communities.

Property changes

People said that they are concerned about homes being torn down to expand the highway, property values decreasing for homeowners in the project area, and neighborhoods being destroyed. Many people also said that there will be more noise, air, and light pollution if the highway is expanded and that would negatively affect the quality of life for residents adjacent to the project area.

Some people explained that they are concerned about their housing security because past MnDOT construction projects to build I-94 and I-35W have displaced people of color and Black communities in the Twin Cities. There were also some comments about the original construction of Hwy 252/I-94 taking property and homes away from people living in the project area and the affects this has on communities living there today.

Common themes from comments about property changes:

• Many people were concerned about losing property or homes to expand the highway.

Comments about access to jobs, healthy food, and greenspace:

"I ranked health topics number one because it's extremely important to be healthy and be able to have the necessities to do so. You can't live without health, healthy food options, and it would be hard to go through life with no job."

"Transportation is about getting you places from where you are to where you want to go. Therefore my top three are access, safety and options. The rest is all nice to have but not necessity."

Comments about property impacts:

"Don't build a freeway through our neighborhoods."

"Some of the Twin Cities most unique properties are near 252 and a community that fosters the most diversity in Minnesota, these are irreplaceable properties and community and destroying the neighborhoods and continuity creates long-term problems such as occurred in St. Paul in the Rondo neighborhood."

- Many people said they were concerned about home values decreasing due to more noise, air, and light pollution from the highway.
- Some people said that MnDOT's displacement of BIPOC communities for I-94 and I-35W construction makes them concerned for housing security for racially diverse communities along Hwy 252/I-94.

Environment and human health

Overall participants ranked environmental and human health as the top focus area. People who selected this focus area tended to separate human health and environmental health. They distinguished human health as the health and wellbeing of individuals, and environmental health as the health of the surrounding natural environment, with a focus on the Mississippi River and its wildlife.

Regarding human health, people said that they are concerned about air pollution affecting the future and quality of life for communities adjacent to Hwy 252/I-94. Some shared concerns that expanding the highway would increase air pollution and cause greater health issues and asthma levels for people living nearby.

Likewise, some people were concerned that expanding Hwy 252/I-94 would require more pavement and cause more water pollution in the Mississippi River from highway runoff. Others shared concerns that carbon emissions from increased traffic could increase the severity of climate change.

Comments about environment and human health:

"We are a predominantly a community of color. Our community already suffers disproportionately from respiratory diseases and toxins and fumes that we are aware are diverted from white neighborhoods into our communities. This has a huge impact on our health and well being, our ability to stay in school and be at work in addition to incurring high medical bills."

"The health impacts are real. As traffic volumes have increased over the years, I have developed asthma. Car/truck exhaust is the most severe trigger for my breathing issues."

Common themes from comments about the environment and human health:

- Many people said that individuals and communities need health to thrive.
- Many people said that they are concerned about the effects of air pollution and increased traffic on Hwy 252/I-94 for respiratory issues and asthma levels in their communities.
- Many people said that environmental health is important and shared concerns that expanding the highway would increase carbon emissions due to higher traffic levels and more pavement would increase runoff and water pollution in the Mississippi River.

Safety

Safety was a top-rated focus area. Many people said that Hwy 252/I-94 needs to be safer for all users. Participants said that they are concerned about speeding, car crashes, and reckless drivers. Some people said that they don't walk, bike, or drive in the project area because they are afraid for their safety. Some also said that youth, elderly, people with a disability, and people who are low income are particularly vulnerable to dangerous drivers because they may not have safe transportation options for walking, biking, and taking transit.

Some participants recommended solutions to make the highway safer. Some people said removing the traffic lights would eliminate the risk of dangerous collisions at intersections, constructing pedestrian bridges would keep people walking, biking, and

Comments about safety:

"My emphasis was on people's lives. The corridor and adjacent neighborhood roads need to be safe for bikers, walkers, and drivers. I'm concerned about increased neighborhood traffic next to where people walk & bike, as well as intersection vehicle accidents."

"Safety is paramount - none of the other options matter if the community (commuters, pedestrians, and bikers) are not safe on or near this roadway. As it is now, 252 is very dangerous."

rolling away from cars, educating drivers on yielding and zip merging would reduce accidents, and reducing congestion and the number of single-occupancy cars on the road would diminish opportunities for crashes to occur.

Some highlights from comments about safety:

- Many people are concerned about safety on Hwy 252/I-94.
- Many people said that reckless drivers are the primary cause of danger on the highway.
- Some people identified that people who are low income, people with a disability, youth, and elderly are particularly vulnerable to traffic accidents because they are more likely to travel in the project area by walking, biking, or rolling.
- Some people recommended ideas to improve safety, including remove traffic lights, construct pedestrian bridges, educate drivers, and reduce congestion and cars.

Other

Some participants identified other focus areas important for health and equity in their communities that were missing from the focus areas that project staff shared.

Accessibility

Some people said that an important component of health and equity is ensuring gathering places, sidewalks, and trails are accessible for people who use mobility devices. A healthy community is welcoming and accessible for people with a disability, people using strollers, and the elderly.

Medical care and emergency access

Some people said that ensuring emergency access (ambulance, fire, and police) to neighborhoods adjacent to the highway is not negatively affected by changes to the highway is important to support health and equity in their communities.

Crime and enforcement

Some people said reducing crime in communities and increasing enforcement of traffic laws along the highway is important for their health and equity. People said changes to the highway design is not enough. Drivers can be reckless and there needs to be more enforcement of traffic laws. Additionally, people said crime in neighborhoods negatively affects the quality of life and wellbeing of the community. More needs to be done to reduce crime and any changes to the highway should not encourage criminal activities.

Other comments:

"There are areas where parks and public spaces need additional accessibility for wheelchairs, stroller access — for example parks often have non-rollable surface in play areas."

"I hope the changes do not make it harder for fire and police to protect me."

"Building better roads doesn't necessarily improve safety with so many speeders and aggressive drivers on the roads...
Unblocking adjacent roads (i.e. West River Road) will encourage drivers to bypass 252 during peak hours and speed through residential streets like they did...I believe more patrolling of the intersections between I-94 and 610 would discourage speeders and those who regularly run red lights at those sites."

"Noise pollution from cars on the freeway goes all night long. I hate it that I have to wear ear plugs at night so I can get uninterrupted sleep at night. I don't open my windows or doors ever to get fresh air into my house. Traffic noise is to loud. It's difficult to impossible to sit outside because of the noise."

Noise pollution

Some people said that changes to the highway should not increase noise pollution for nearby communities. Some participants said noise is already a problem for homes near the highway and expanding it or increasing traffic volumes would make the area more stressful and less livable for residents.

6. Results: Equitable outcomes

Participants were asked how the project team can ensure the benefits and burdens of Hwy 252/I-94 improvements are equitable. Some of the top answers were: ensure nearby residents are not unfairly burdened by highway changes that benefit commuters, maintain local access, and engage communities most likely to be burdened by changes in the highway on the new design.

Participants said that any burdens and benefits from Hwy 252/I-94 improvements should be fairly and equitably distributed to all highway users. Many people said that Hwy 252/I-94 improvements should not solely benefit commuters traveling through the area at the expense of residents living along or near

Comments about equitable outcomes

"Don't mess up our community just to benefit those who live farther away. Brooklyn Center is a highly diverse community that should not be penalized so people who perceive themselves to be of a higher class can get to work faster."

"People of all ethnic backgrounds who live in this area should be represented at the table and share in the decision."

the highway. Some people expressed concern for losing local access and connectivity to improve ease of travel for pass through traffic. Some said that making it more difficult for residents to access their homes, jobs, and public transit via walking, biking, or driving burdens everyone in the community, but particularly people who are low-income, people with a disability, and BIPOC families.

Participants recommended that community members should have a say in selecting the preferred alternative to ensure equitable burdens and benefits. People said that the project team should listen to concerns and input from the communities that could be most burdened by changes to the highway. Some recommended especially engaging populations who have been historically left out of government decision-making, including BIPOC communities, people with low incomes, the elderly, and people with a disability.

Highlights from comments about ensuring equitable outcomes:

- Many people said that commuters shouldn't benefit from changes to Hwy 252/I-94 at the expense of residents.
- Many said that changes to the highway shouldn't make it easier for pass through traffic to get through the highway and harder for people to travel within the community by walking, biking, rolling, or driving.
- Many people said that the people most likely to be negatively affected by changes to the highway should have a say in the highway's design.

7. Next steps

This report summarizes public input received as part of the community engagement process for the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA. The EHNA and project team will use this community feedback to conduct a community-driven health and equity review of the Hwy 252/I-94 project alternatives.

The Equity and Health Community Priorities Report is the second of three Hwy 252/I-94 EHA reports that will be developed during the Scoping Decision Document (SDD) phase of the Hwy 252/I-94 Environmental Review. The third Hwy 252/I-94 EHA Reports – Equity and Health Assessment of the Hwy 252/I-94 SDD – will be released in fall 2022. This report will be a community-driven assessment of Hwy 252/I-94 project alternatives, and recommendations for what, if any, changes to the SDD should be considered before MnDOT proceeds to final review and approval. Recommendations could also identify recommendations that fall outside of the project's scope for consideration by MnDOT and/or other agencies.

MnDOT is doing an Equity and Health Assessment (EHA) on Hwy 252/I-94 to consider how a transportation project may affect people's health in the area.

What do we mean by "equity and health"?

Equitable transportation ensures the benefits and burdens of transportation spending, services, and systems are fair and just, which historically has not been the case. Transportation equity also requires intentionally integrating perspectives of those who traditionally have not been involved in decision-making, especially with Black people, Indigenous people, and other People of Color.

The Hwy 252/I-94 EHA considers transportation's impact on health and well-being and the involvement of historically underserved and overburdened communities in transportation decisions on Hwy 252/I-94. The EHA will look at transportation and its role in things like safety, physical activity, air and water quality, community cohesion, and people's ability to get where they need to go.

HOW WILL EQUITY AND HEALTH BE ASSESSED?

The EHA combines health data and targeted community engagement to understand equity and health conditions and priorities in communities along Hwy 252/I-94. To ground the EHA in community, MnDOT formed an Equity and Health Neighborhood Advisors (EHNA) group of residents from Hwy 252/I-94 communities. The EHNA provides input on reports, engagement activities, and potential transportation improvements based on EHA findings.


What's the timeline?

HIGHWAY 252/I-94 ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW EQUITY AND HEALTH ASSESSMENT

MnDOT is doing an Equity and Health Assessment (EHA) on Hwy 252/I-94 to consider how a transportation project may affect people's health in the area.

What do we mean by "equity and health"?

Equitable transportation ensures the benefits and burdens of transportation spending, services, and systems are fair and just, which historically has not been the case. Transportation equity also requires intentionally integrating perspectives of those who traditionally have not been involved in decision-making, especially with Black people, Indigenous people, and other people of color.

The Hwy 252/I-94 EHA considers transportation's impact on health and well-being and the involvement of historically underserved and overburdened communities in transportation decisions on Hwy 252/I-94. The EHA will look at transportation and its role in things like safety, physical activity, air and water quality, community cohesion, and people's ability to get where they need to go.

HOW WILL EQUITY AND HEALTH BE ASSESSED?

The EHA combines health data and targeted community engagement to understand equity and health conditions and priorities in communities along Hwy 252/I-94. To ground the EHA in community, MnDOT formed an Equity and Health Neighborhood Advisors (EHNA) group of residents from Hwy 252/I-94 communities. The EHNA provides input on reports, engagement activities, and potential transportation improvements based on EHA findings.

What's the timeline?

The Hwy 252/I-94 EHA will run from mid-2021 through 2024. Results of the EHA will be documented and included as public input at multiple points in the Hwy 252/I-94 environmental review, starting with the Hwy 252/I-94 Scoping Decision Document public comment period in the summer of 2022.

How can you get involved?

As a person who may be impacted by this project, your involvement and feedback is important to the EHA. You are invited to participate in the

Hwy 252/I-94 EHA at a community meeting, a community pop-up event, or online through the EHA survey. At these events, you will be asked to answer questions like:

- How does Hwy 252/I-94 affect you?
- What health topic do you most want to see explored in depth as part of the Hwy 252/I-94 EHA? Why?
- . What is most important to make Hwy 252/I-94 healthier and more equitable?
- What else should MnDOT think about relative to equity and health on Hwy 252/ I-94?
